Dear Parents/Carers,

It is so lovely to see all the children back in the classroom, after a well-deserved half term. We are in our final half-term of the year now and it has been a joy seeing how the children have matured and progressed this year in the time that I have been here. We look forward to our new learning this half term.

We will be covering a range of subject areas this half term as outlined below.

English	In guided reading this half term we will read a range of texts and practice our
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	comprehension skills of retrieval and inference.
	In English, we will start by writing a non-chronological report to teach other
	children about play – its benefits and ideas on how to play. We will then be
	completing a short story unit featuring 'The Girl Who Stole an Elephant' by
	Nizrana Farook. This book will be our class novel as we read it alongside
	completing the unit. We will then write our own action story based on the
	book.
